 - 1. Christ’s enemies did not attempt to deny that a miracle had been performed

 - 1. The reason for the rejection (Romans 1)

III. Jesus Masterfully Reasons (Luke 11:17-22)

- A. Jesus answered their charges with three arguments
 - 1. Their accusation was illogical (vv. 17-18)
 - 2. Their charges were self-incriminating (v. 19)
 - 3. Their accusation was really an admission of His power (vv. 20-22)
- B. Christ’s war against Satan (vv. 21-22)
 - 1. Jesus invaded Satan’s territory (v. 22)
 - 2. Jesus overcame Satan’s power (v. 22)
 - a) His incarnation (Genesis 3:15)
 - b) His sinless life
 - c) His miracles of healing and deliverance
 - d) His crucifixion
 - e) His resurrection
 - f) His ascension and exaltation
 - g) His future Second Coming
