"Will Jesus Come Again?" 2 Peter 3:1-10

I. Introduction

- A. Will Jesus come again?
 - 1. According to 2 Peter 3, the answer is yes.
 - 2. Christians for two thousand years have been waiting for and looking for the coming again of Jesus Christ.
 - 3. In Chapter 1, Peter calls us to be "standing in holiness."
 - 4. In Chapter 2, he calls us to be "standing against heresy."
 - 5. Now, in Chapter 3, he calls us to be "standing in hope."
 - a) Why does Peter want us to be "standing in hope?"
 - 1) Because of "scoffers" (vv. 3-4)
 - Some said, "Jesus won't come again to judge sin," but Peter said, "Yes, He will."
 - 3) Don't lose your expectation of the "blessed hope of the glorious appearing of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ."
- B. Peter gives us four solemn admonitions
 - 1. "Beloved be mindful" (vv. 1-2)
 - 2. "Beloved be not ignorant" (v. 8)
 - 3. "Beloved be diligent" (v. 14)
 - 4. "Beloved beware" (v. 17)

II. Beloved be Mindful (2 Peter 3:1-7)

- A. Peter wanted them to remember a key theme in 2 Peter.
 - 1. Remember the truth of God's Word (v. 2)
 - a) "Spoken by the Holy Prophets" (Old Testament)
 - b) "The commandments of the apostles" (New Testament)
 - 1) The New Testament is also God's Word.
 - c) Why do we believe Jesus will come again?
 - 1) Because he says He will
 - 2) That is why we are standing on God's Word
 - 2. Remember, scoffers will come (vv. 3-4)
 - a) "Most importantly, I want to remind you that in the last days scoffers will come mocking the truth and following their own desires." (NLT)
 - b) "They will come in the last days" (v. 3)

- c) "They will scoff or mock" (v. 3)
- d) Who are "they," and what are they mocking?
 - 1) The idea that Jesus is coming back to judge sin
- e) Why do they scoff?
 - 1) "Walking after their own lust" (v. 3)
 - 2) Their argument (v. 4)
 - a. It's called "uniformitarianism."
 - i. "The view that the cosmic processes of the present and future can be understood solely on the basis of how the cosmos has operated in the past."
 - ii. They say, "God is not going to break into history and interrupt natural law and the progress of time."
- f) Peter points out their willing ignorance (vv. 5-7)
 - 1) That God created the world by His Word (v.5)
 - a. "They deliberately forget that God made the heavens by the Word of His command and He brought the earth out from the water and surrounded it with water" (NLT).
 - b. God made the universe.
 - c. God sustains the universe.
 - d. God can intervene in His universe.
 - 2) That God has intervened in His universe
 - a. "God flooded the world with water" (v. 6).
 - b. (Genesis 6-9)
 - 3) That God will destroy the world by fire (v. 7)
 - a. The end of the world
 - b. When?
 - i. "New heaven and new earth" (Revelation 21:1)
 - ii. "We look for a new heaven and a new earth" (v. 13)
 - iii. There's a new world coming.

III. Beloved Be Not Ignorant (2 Peter 3:8-10)

- A. Peter answers the question, "Why hasn't Jesus come back yet?"
 - 1. God is eternal (v. 8)
 - a) God is not bound by time.
 - 2. God is long-suffering (v. 9)
 - a) God wants you to repent and be saved.
- B. Peter gives us the assurance that the Lord will come (v. 10).
 - 1. The Lord will come to judge sinners
 - 2. Why? Because "God is holy and righteous."
 - 3. He hates and judges sin

V. Conclusion

 - 1. The cross!
 - a) Realize you have sinned
 - b) Repent of your sin
 - c) Received Jesus as your Savior
 - 1) (John 3:16)
 - 2) (Ephesians 2:8-9)
